PULLMAN - Financial Advisor Ken Abbey reports that the crew has received final approval from the Army Corps of Engineers to build the new shellhouse.

The shellhouse will be located at Wawawai landing, one half mile upstream from Wawawai

Construction drawings and specifications for the building are complete and awaiting approval from Whitman County officials and an environmental checklist for the project has been prepared.

Abbey said that should everything fall into place, the project will go to bid in January.

A floathouse concept for storage of the coaching launches from a design by a Spokane dock manufacturer is also in the works and will require Corps of Engineers approval.

Abbey is hopeful construction will be completed in time for an April or May dedication date.

Regionals slated for **Liberty Lake**

SPOKANE — For the first time in its thirteen year history, the Pacific Northwest Regional Rowing Championships will be held in eastern Washington.

The largest rowing regatta in the state will be held at beautiful Liberty Lake, hosted by the Cougar Rowing Association on May 12 and 13.

The race on the fully buyoyed, six-lane, 2000 meter course will be sanctuioned by the USRA.

The decision to move the site for the 1984 championships to Liberty Lake in Spokane was finalized by unanimous vote of the organizations participating in the fall Regional Rowing Board meeting of the USRA and NWRA on Oct. 9.

Following a short presentation of the formal bid to host the regatta, representatives from the Liberty Lake regatta steering committee fielded questions from the representatives of local crews and outlined their request for a \$1,000 loan from the regional treasury in order to cover start-up costs for this year's championships. The loan was also approved unanimously, folowing the vigorous endorsement of LWRC's Roger Payne.

Aiming at a budget of around \$5,000 for this year's regatta, members of the steering committee have commenced a large scale fund raising drive aimed at. netting at least two thirds of that

amount by April, 1984. The remainder is anticipated to be raised by concession sales at the race itself.

The steering committee this year includes Bob Appleyard, officials; Doug Engle, Gene Dowers and Rich Ray, directors.

Expenses will include the cost of upgrading the equipment used to lay out and take up the racecourse lines, buoys and anchors, and a communications system which will be capable of handling race commentary and scheduling as well as official

communiques.
On Nov. 17, Dowers and Ray made a brief presentation of the current status and plans for the regatta to interested members of the Liberty Lake community. Those in attendance responded warmly to the news that they would be hosts to the largest

rowing regatta in the state.

Bob Wills, president of the
Liberty Lake Property Owners Association, and chief organizer of efforts in the community last year, has already begun seeking billeting for athletes in the homes of community volunteers.

Coug Crew numbers up for fall

PULLMAN - Coach Rich "Flip" Ray reports numbers are up somewhat this year on the women's team as three full eights occasionally ply the Snake River waters while the men's crew will see hot competition for the lightweight eight.

Freshmen make up nearly half of the women's crew, which should translate into tough competition for seats in the frosh

Of the returning athletes, Ray is looking for outstanding performances from the sophomore class. Lisa Stivers (co-commodore this year along with Tracy Coates) and Brenda Frederick. last year's bow pair in the varsity eight will be attempting to achieve the elusive status of lightweights. Should they do so, a light four, inspired by senior Natalie Nelson and junior Colleen Towery, both veterans of the outstanding light eights of '80 and '81, could prove one of our toughest combinations.

Among the open ranks, seniors Sara Bolson and Tammy Boggs, stroke pair from last season's eight, retain positions of leadership. Teammates Sue Van Leuven (senior) and Mary Jane Sheenstra (senior transfer from SPU) are both second-year athletes and top contenders for the open eight. An open four composed of these women should be

extremely competitive.
Seniors Cheryl King and Anna Stowe and sophomores Terri Jacobson (club treasurer) and Tracy Coates, all returning from the last spring's novice eight, are consistent performers who will be filling seats in the varsity eights this year.

Coates will fill the coxwain's seat, a position to which she is a recent, and very promising convert. Of last year's coxwains, senior Brook Thomson will be tranferring from nursing school in the spring, but Kim Heggerness, club entrepreneur par excellence, will be with the crew in the spring.

Ray reports all are looking forward to racing in '84.

Among the men, varsity propects have been slim for a number of years, though this season will see 12 lightweights, eight of them experienced, battling for seats in what is consistently the club's winningest boat.

Brian Dugan, will be leading the pack after two summers at Vesper Boat Club and the highest ergometer score on the team (heavies included) to his credit.

In the heavyweight ranks, seven members of last season's outstanding frosh eight have returned. Three of them, Mike McQuaid, Joe Eastwood and Pete Ramels, spent a summer racing

NORTHWEST REGIONAL ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS

SEATTLE — The Washington State University crew placed fourth out of 16 crews in November at the annual Green Lake Fall Regatta.

The Nov. 12 race was the lone competition of the fall season as the Head of the Lake regatta scheduled for the following day was blown off a white cap filled Lake Washington.

Highlighting racing results for the Cougs was the first place finish by the men's lightweight four in a field of 11 boats. The WSU crew completed the 1,000 meter race course with a time of

In other men's racing action, the open novice eight finished seventh in a field of 12, behind

two UVic and three UBC crews. The men's light eight was third

behind WWU and LWRC, with a

time of 3:31 while the men's open four placed third behind UBC


The men's open eight placed eighth, the men's novice four took fifth and the intermediate eight was fourth.

A close race in the women's novice eight race highlighted racing action for the women as WSU placed third in a time of 4:16. behind the University of Oregon crew who won it with a time of 4:13.

The women's intermedicate four was third, the open four second in a time of 4:13.4. The women's intermediate eight placed second behind Green Lake crew in a time of 4:19.4 while the open novice four scored sixth.

The women's open eight captured third behind Western and Green Lake.

A new project

SEATTLE — Next month will bring announcement of the annual Cougar Rowing Association membership fund raising drive.

The yearly effort to raise money to support the crew at Washington State University will ask for participation from every alum through contributions.

1983 proved to be one of the most successful fund raising years on record for the Cougar Rowing Association. More than \$1,200 was raised in the request for funds by the CRA.

The 1983 fireworks stand also proved a success, with a net income of \$2,695.64.

The money was allocated between the men's and women's crews and the alumni association, according to level of participation.

The distribution of cash resulted in \$1.455 toward new ergometers and more than \$1,200 to the alumni association.
