Head of the Spokane

The fourth annual Head of the Spokane regatta went off under calm and chilly conditions Saturday, October 29th. The race was held on Long Lake—part of the Spokane river downstream from the city. Distance was supposed to be three miles, but fast finish times cast doubt on that figure. Boats were started at intervals, rowed a triangular course around two bouys and back to the start.

The event indicates that rowing continues to experience healthy growth here in the Northwest. Two Canadian boat clubs, one from Calgary and another from Alberta were represented, and a new Idaho team attended. North Idaho College entered two Pocock eights. One of them, the Spirit of '61, had been purchased from WSU, whence it had retired after getting bumped off the racks at Husky Hilton. The second shell is on loan from WSU and may soon be sold to Idaho, according to Ken Abbey.

WSU contributed more than just hardware to this team startup. Head coach is Bob Siegwarth '84, who came to WSU on a wrestling scholarship, but did some of his best conditioning in Cougar shells.

Gonzaga hosted the race, and showed itself again as a fully-developed small college program—an impressive accomplishment, well illustrated by two defeats of Cougar heavy eights last season. The Bulldog crews finished a solid second in overall points, based on the Greenlake scoring system.

Last fall an ergathon was organized as a joint project by the women's and men's teams. The crew used the WSU Foundation phone bank to call and ask friends and relatives to pledge a donation. Two ergometers were set up in the Compton Union Building (CUB) lobby and rowers kept the wheels spinning for twelve hours. Follow-up letters were later sent to those pledging funds. \$1,900 has been netted so far with more expected.

In addition, the crew provided labor for the Cougar Food Fair and netted \$1,000. They also handed out packets at fall and spring registration for another

You may have read in your last Hilltopics that the Parent's Association granted the crew \$4,000. This money will be used to buy two new ergometers, radios for coaching launches and other safety equipment required by the Crew Safety Program, recently updated for the WSU Safety Division.

The big fundraiser is yet to come. February 24th and 25th the crew will run a casino night at Shermer's (formerly the Oriental). Last year this event netted \$7,200. Ken Abbey, crew advisor, believes that this year's event will be just as profitable, since few casino nights were held in Pullman during the fall.

Asked what the crew was going to spend all this money on, Abbey answered: "Survival!" The women are saving for a new shell and oars. Salaries for coaches in both programs, launch repairs, boathouse upkeep and development, gas money, travel expenses and settling debts are other items he rattled

These Pullman-generated resources are supplemented by the interest from the Crew Endowment Fund. With some luck at the casino in February, our crew should be in healthy financial condition. In typical Cougar Crew fashion, cash has flowed in by many channels to keep the shell afloat.
